Pupil Premium Strategy Statement (2018/19) Dudley Infant Academy

What is the pupil premium?

- The pupil premium is a sum of money given to schools each year to support:
 - Raising the attainment of disadvantaged pupils of all abilities to reach their potential
 - Children and young people with parents in the regular armed forces

Why do schools receive this?

- Research shows that children who are in low income families do less well academically than those who are not. They sometimes face challenges such as poor language skills, less family support and issues with attendance and punctuality. The extra funding is intended to directly benefit those pupils who are eligible.

Your child is eligible if he or she:

- Has qualified for free school meals (FSM) at any point in the last six years
- Has been looked after under local authority care for more than one day, been adopted from care or has left care
- Has a parent in the regular armed forces

How is it spent?

- Academies can choose how to spend the money for the educational benefit of the pupils of the academy
- Schools are accountable for how they spend the money and Ofsted will report on the attainment and progress of disadvantaged pupils who attract the pupil premium during an inspection

How do we ensure that our spending is effective?

- Through regular monitoring of student data
- By evaluating and reviewing our strategy
- By keeping abreast of research and developments and being proactive in our approach to implementing new strategies
- By not being afraid to change a strategy that isn't working

Reading intervention Teaching Assistants to support reading and phonics in 1:1 and small groups daily	Children to make expected progress in reading and phonics	<p>73% of Pupil Premium pupils met GLD (Good Level of Development) in the Early Years Foundation Stage. The National Pupil Premium standard was 57%. Both of these outcomes can be compared against 74% of Non-Pupil Premium pupils achieving GLD.</p> <p>This gap of -1% compared against the 2016/17 gap of - 6% represents a 5% narrowing of the gap since last year.</p> <p>75% of Pupil Premium pupils achieved the national expectation for phonics screening in Year 1. This is an increase of 33% from last year. The national standard for PP children was 72% and the national standard for Non PP was 85%.</p> <p>93% of Pupil Premium pupils achieved the national expectation for phonics screening in the Year 2 retake. This is an increase of 19% from last</p>

		<p>year. Non Pupil Premium pupils achieved 98%. The national standard for PP children was 85% and the national standard for Non PP was 94%.</p> <p>At the end of KS1 results, 60% of Pupil Premium children achieved ARE (Age Related Expectations) in Reading – an increase of 15% year on year. This compares to 79% of Non-Pupil Premium pupils nationally. 71% of those who didn't achieve ARE were also on the SEND register. The national standard for PP children was 63%.</p>
