Geographical skills and fieldwork

Draw information from a simple map of their own locality.

Use photos, films or their own experiences to explore different countries in the world and talk about the differences they have experienced or seen in various media.

Explain some similarities and differences between life in this country and life in other countries, drawing on knowledge from stories, non-fiction texts and (when appropriate) maps.

Know some similarities and differences between the natural world around them and contrasting environments, drawing on their experiences and what has been read in class. Use maps, geographical information, photographs and sources to support and enhance learning about an area

Use world maps, atlases and globes to identify the United Kingdom and its countries

Use locational and directional language [for example, near and far; left and right], to describe the location of features and routes on a map

Use aerial photographs and plan perspectives to recognise landmarks and basic human and physical features

Devise a simple map

Use simple fieldwork and observational skills to study the geography of their school and its grounds

Use world maps, atlases and globes to identify the countries, continents and oceans

Use simple compass directions (North, South, East and West)

Use aerial photographs and plan perspectives to recognise landmarks and basic human and physical features
